

### 9/10 Boys Knockout Soccer at Cornerstone College, Mount Barker

On Tuesday 3 September, the 9/10 Boys Knockout Football (soccer) team travelled to Mount Barker to play against Cornerstone College in Round 2 of the School Sport SA Knockout competition. The boys had an early start, departing Tenison Woods College before 6.30am, but thankfully when they arrived, they were greeted by perfect, sunny conditions with only a slight breeze blowing across the carpet-like pitch.

After overcoming a shaky start, the Titans gained the upper hand as Ben Imani and Marcus Gajic's effective link-up play in the midfield helped to create several goal-scoring opportunities. The momentum shifted around the 12th minute when Masimba Chindewere was brought on and he connected immediately with Josh Kumbhare and Ryley Stephenson who finished off a fine team move to open the scoring a mere five minutes later. Marcus Gajic calmly doubled the lead from the penalty spot that released some of the pressure that was starting to build. In the 32nd minute, a momentary miscommunication in defence allowed Cornerstone College to peg-back the score, ensuring the teams remained close at half-time.

However, it was not long into the second half when the Titans were able to regain control. Ryley scored his second in the 52nd minute and Thomas Damhuis added another three minutes later. Ben arguably scored the best goal of the day in the 60th minute that capped off a devasting 10-minute spell, as he skilfully beat two defenders and shot from the edge of the box to make it 5-1. Kahne Jeffery and Desire Kinyamba tackled well throughout the game and repelled each attack with confidence, meaning Sam Swiggs had a peaceful second half. Ryley popped up with a last-minute goal to seal his hattrick and the dominant win. The Tenison Woods College Titans now progress to the finals in Week 10.

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### YEAR 5 EXCURSION TO CITY COUNCIL: A DAY OF GOVERNMENT INSIGHTS

The day began with a special visit from Tony Pasin, the Federal Member for Barker. 
